From the Director's Desk

In addition to the many learning resources and programs that the library makes available, those who are unemployed, retired, or searching for a job, or do not have internet service at home, can use library computers or Wi-Fi to access a wealth of information. There are also job services, children's literacy programs, STEAM programs, cultural programming, and so much more that may interest someone in starting a new hobby or developing a new skill.

Check out this issue of the *Weathervane* to learn about the wealth of programs available at your library, including: book discussions, craft programs, Excel classes, cultural programs, and so much more. Also, this spring the library has partnered with AARP, Maryland Legal Aide, the Talbot County Circuit Court, and other agencies to bring tax and legal assistance to patrons at our libraries—all of it, of course, absolutely free of charge.

Check out and download free ebooks, audiobooks, and free streaming movies Use our scanner to email photos and documents to yourself or others for free Use a study room for a small meeting, to study, or to complete a project Use an electronic resource to get help from a tutor, learn a new language, or get résumé help *Coming soon: both branches will be checking out Wi-Fi hotspots and Chromebooks for use by patrons at home. This spring, the library will also be offering Choose Civility programming, which is part of an ongoing nation-wide initiative, organized by the Howard County Library System, that values diversity, respect, compassion, empathy, and inclusiveness as essential to our quality of life. Partial funding for this initiative is provided by a grant through the Maryland State Library. Library programs, book discussions, and talks will be highlighted in our *Weathervane*. I hope to see you this spring in the library taking advantage of all the eResources, books, programs, and services that your library has to offer.
